# Committee Round Up by Mark White

## Committee and AGM Round Up.

**AGM.** The AGM was held in the Hub Club on 14th November and 10 members turned up in addition to the committee and President. Reports and Minutes of the Meeting have been circulated and members are asked to note the content and contribute their ideas to the committee in 2014.

**Maze Orienteering.** A working group of Peter Hambleton, Charlotte Thornton and Liz Yeardon has been formed to purchase and plan the use of maze equipment in 2014.

**Membership.** Fees for this year have been maintained at their current level but will increase by £1 the following year. Gwyn Davies now holds a stock of A4 trifolds about the club and membership. Please contact him if you see an opening to promote the club and need some.

**Sarum Saunter 2014.** Preparations for Sarum Saunter are well underway with flyer issued and updates being made to the map. Martin Goddard is Planner and Pat Hart is the organiser.

**Salisbury City.** We currently plan to run the next Salisbury City race in 2015 alongside the November Classic. Preparations for this will include mapping the northern part of the city. We also intend to run a Wessex Night league event in November 2014.

**Southern Championships 2016.** We tried hard to be the organising club for this event but were not successful for a variety of reasons, including uncertainty surrounding future access to Hamptworth. However, we will be hosting the Compass Sport qualifying round in the same year.

**CST 1<sup>st</sup> Round - 16<sup>th</sup> Feb.** Following the Club Captain's canvassing of members, we decided to opt for Haytor. Our entry has now been confirmed. The event will be subsidised

as normal in order to encourage as many as possible to attend. Minibus transport is being investigated.

**Maps.** £1500 has been earmarked in this year's budget for mapping. We are looking for a new large area that could be mapped as well as some smaller areas. Please contact the committee if you have any suggestions.

**Website.** Rob Ashton has kindly agreed to take over the running of our website from Brian Hart. We will take this opportunity to refresh it and make sure all the content is up to date and relevant.

**SCAN.** After more than 50 editions, Brian Hart will be retiring as editor after the January edition. A new editor is sought. Please contact the Chairman if you would be willing to take on this role for a period of time.

**40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary coasters.** If you have not received yours, please contact Liz Yeardon.

**BOF Rules 2014.** There is a helpful guide to the recent changes on the Events/Rules page of the BOF website. Members are asked to make themselves aware of these changes.

**Training Day.** It is planned to arrange a training day covering the roles of organiser, planner and controller in the New Year. The aim is to help encourage more recent members to take on one of these roles in 2014. More information to follow.

**Club Championships.** The date for this has now been fixed as Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> June. The intention is to hold a late afternoon event followed by a BBQ.

**EMIT Hire for juniors.** Following lengthy discussion on the subject, it has been agreed to maintain a 50 pence charge for EMIT hire for juniors.

Having done a lot of Urban Orienteering over recent years, and knowing the City of Salisbury very well, I always suspected it would provide a good venue for an event. However, when the first map was drawn up mid 2012, there were a number of large areas of private property marked in dark green. If we could get those areas mapped, namely the private schools, then that could provide a different dimension to the event, with some micro nav, sprint style orienteering within regular long urban courses. And so the 12 month body of work started for the organising committee, agreement and mapping of the schools, map updates, plan, replan and tweak the courses.

One of the enlightening aspects of it has been the general positiveness and support when dealing with and asking for permission to run round private grounds. Having worked in the public sector before, you think the default response to any request, will be a 'no'; but that has just not been the case. The responses were more like 'that's a great idea', 'can we take part', 'no problem with that'.

The start area location was probably one of the trickier things to work out. We always wanted

to start within the Cathedral Close, and finish at the Cathedral. As there are only 4 access points to the close, 2 of which had been made out of bounds for safety reasons, given the busy roads, it proved quite challenging to deconflict the 7 courses. Putting the start inside The Cathedral School was a late change, and only came about because the school didn't want lots of people coming in and out of their front gate that day. I was glad we moved it, as it worked out really well in the end.

Another tricky aspect to urban orienteering is the siting and fixing of controls to street furniture. As they are secured with a 'grippler' self locking wire, to prevent them getting stolen, lamp posts and trees prove very suitable fixing points. After you have worked out where you can actually site checkpoints, only then can you plan the courses around those locations.

There are many more factors involved in planning an urban event than a traditional forest event, which does require flexibility and having to think outside the box at times. Despite the discussions, opinions and arguments in the months beforehand, it did all work out well on the day.

Plans for this started in 2012 when Mike Hampton completed the map. In early January 2013 I had a meeting with Colin Hicks and discussions with several other urban organisers to find out the pitfalls and problems in organising an urban event. For me, as organiser, it proved to be a big learning curve as it is much more complex than organising a forest event. When I spoke to those who had previously organised urbans, they all emphasised the importance of early planning as it can be quite involved and time consuming to get the necessary permissions. Andy Snell, a great urban enthusiast, was to be the planner.

Although I had to learn a lot, what amazed me in all my dealings with the various agencies - roads, byways, police, parks, events - with the Cathedral, the schools, the museums, the YHA, was firstly the interest they all showed when I approached them and explained what orienteering was, their initial positive, friendly reactions and then the amazing support they gave me from then on in. They were all always so helpful.

The Cathedral staff were happy for us to use the Close and agreed to the start and finish in front of the building itself. This I believe not only gave the race a special charm and atmosphere but also provided added interest to the competitors. The four schools - Godolphin, Chaffyn Grove, Leadenhall and The Cathedral

School, Arundells and the YHA also gave permission to map their sites and to use them for controls. This variety of terrain made the race not only more interesting but provided more technical challenges. Again all the people I worked with were so supportive and positive.

The assembly area - the Sports Hall of Bishop Wordsworth's School turned out to be an inspired venue, suggested by Andy. Not only was the hall itself large and functional but the shower and loo facilities were an added bonus. The teacher in charge of letting could not have been more helpful. He was away in Morocco on the actual day with a school trip but he left detailed instructions to all concerned. In my last email to him I suggested that I would be prepared to tick a community service box for any 6th. formers doing D of E or other award who turned up to help. When we arrived on the Friday to set up I had two wonderful surprises. Firstly John Blaine, the site manager for the day turned out to be John - the landlord of the pub in Quidhampton where Sarum held Committee meetings for years - which proved a happy reunion as nothing was too much trouble for John. Secondly a dozen or so 6th. formers were waiting to do anything we asked them - from putting up signage, carrying furniture, running errands, covering the floor - not only for as long as we wanted them on Friday but from 8.30a.m. on Saturday all day. They were a real pleasure to work with, full of good ideas and energy.



Moreover, their sense of responsibility and reliability was a credit to them all. The catering chef turned up at 8a.m. on Saturday with her team who all worked flat out all day to provide hot and cold food for the competitors - at very reasonable prices. To my amazement even the headmaster turned up twice during the morning - with hindsight I think perhaps to check up that we weren't about to trash his spanking new sports hall! In fact John Blaine commented to me on how well orienteers behaved. He couldn't believe how quiet and considerate such a large group of people in a confined space could be and how little clearing up had to be done when we left!!

Two other people who gave an incredible amount of their skill, their expertise and their time to make the City race such a success were the two Chrises - Branford (overall controller) and Huthwaite (controller on the day) Both of them worked tirelessly to inspire and to confirm everything was as it should be.

Then there were the four sponsors. Discover Adventure kindly



found out how successful the day had been he said he would also be more generous next time! The £200 from the Salisbury Journal was spent on engraved glasses for the winners. Beautiful glasses were engraved at a very reasonable cost by Andy Phillips

who runs his own company and whom I happened to come across at the Malvern Show.

donated the first prizes - a large sports bag - to the overall winners. Mulebar gave us some of their products for the class winners. The Salisbury Journal donated £200 for prizes. However, at first, my feeling was that the only sponsor who really believed in our potential success was Nigel Benham (from BML printers) who phoned me to actually offer their sponsorship. (Not only were they the usual

accommodating, helpful and reliable map printers but Nigel kindly agreed to design the original inspirational Cathedral poster and the bibs. He then donated the 600 copies of the photo trail and designed the banners for the finish which he mounted. However, after the event when I saw the Chief editor of The Salisbury Journal, he promised me greater coverage in the Journal the next time we run the race! Also when the Mulebar Chief Executive

Then of course there was the sterling work of Rob Ashton who produced such an excellent website and that of Brian (Hart) who spent hours on the phone to Michael Napier - a computer genius - who gave so much of his time to teach Brian to master the software for a large event - saving the club a great deal of money.

Lastly but certainly not least are all the Sarum members who turned up trumps on the day. Liz and Andy who were out in the middle of the night sitting controls, Chris Huthwaite who was up at dawn checking the control sites. All of you running the start, the finish, marshalling, manning enquiries, checking controls, collecting in controls and generally helping good naturedly wherever it was needed. A big thank you to you all - a great team effort. We had an incredible number of thank yous and a lot of very favourable comments on the courses and the general atmosphere.

We only had one or two minor hitches which were immediately sorted by those responsible. One or two controls in the Cathedral School had to be slightly resited on the day as the tree surgeons were unexpectedly at work on Saturday. A potential problem of a fallen tree in Leadenhall was happily removed the day before the race. One control got totally and utterly vandalised in the Friary - despite Andy's double gripples to prevent theft and his

wooden mountings. Whoever destroyed it went to a great deal of trouble - but the problem was quickly rectified. A worthwhile challenge for the future might be to get the Friary youths on our side in the event of another race - not easily done but worth thinking about.

The Cathedral asked for at least £150 to be donated to it. As we had such a successful day we donated £350 to them - partly to thank them for their support this year and partly to encourage them to support us in the future!

Overall I feel the first Salisbury City Race was a very successful event and reflected well on the club and its members. I personally found it interesting and challenging and feel it is well worth repeating in the future. Working in tandem with the November Classic was an inspired idea and I believe mutually benefitted both Sarum and SOC. Working together with other clubs is perhaps a good way forward for all orienteering.

### British Orienteering's Association and Club Conference

British Orienteering held its annual Association and Club Conference in October, on the theme of Volunteers and Volunteering in Orienteering.

Liz Yeardon (SARUM) attended the conference on behalf of SCOA; her list of the key points from the conference, and the action she suggests SCOA clubs might wish to consider, will be sent to the Sarum Committee. SCOA is asking each club to review this list, and for each club's representative to report back to the March SCOA meeting with their view on which of these actions they feel should be pursued. SCOA is keen to identify items that clubs might work together on, or can help each other on by sharing experiences.

### Training for Organisers, Planners and Controllers

One of SCOA's functions is to provide training for individuals wishing to become Organisers, or Planners, or Controllers.
